

Armed Forces Day at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway

May 21, 2022

This year the Chapter had the opportunity to setup a information table at the Indianapolis Motor Speedway. The morning started out at 05:00 at the Veterans Center to load up the equipment to take to the track. Fuzzy and I tried to load up our Mobile Display Unit in my pickup, but couldn't get it loaded. The wheels on the Mobile Unit were too small to roll on the ramp that we were using.


We didn't let that stop us, so we decided to just take the equipment to setup an table to pass out information about the Chapter and our mission.

At 06:30, we arrived at Stout Field to join the Indiana National Guard convoy to IMS escorted by IMPD. At 07:30 the convoy left Stout Field with several military vehicles to include Howitzers to be on display at the track.

Upon arrival at the track, we setup our tent and information table. After setting up the tent, we noticed that we were missing an important piece of equipment that would help secure the tent in high winds. The tent case didn't have any stakes. As you can tell from the below picture, the winds were high that day and we didn't have a good way to secure the tent. Fuzzy and I spent most of the day, holding down the tent and flags so they wouldn't blow away.

Vern to the rescue. When Vern came to work his shift, he brought some stakes so we could secure the tent. The Indiana National Guard was a great host. They provided us with entry, parking, and meal passes which came in real handy when purchasing food. Two hamburgers with fries cost \$32.00 which was covered by the meal tickets.

The weather report for the rest of the weekend didn't look good and we didn't have a good way to secure our equipment over night, so we decided to pack it up for the weekend and hope we have better weather next year.



The 34th Ride for Freedom is in the books. This year, the Chapter rode to the American Legion Plaza and gave some historical background on each of the memorial's located at the plaza. The Chapter also had a wreath laying ceremony at each memorial in honor of our Indiana Service Members that were Killed in Action and those that remain unaccounted-for.

This year, we had approximately 64 people in attendance with 24 of them being FNG's. Having FNG's at our events is important to our mission of bringing awareness to the public.

The program started off by Kelly Gerard singing the National Anthem, followed by the Pledge of Allegiance by all, and Invocation by the Chapter Chaplain, Tom Ransdell. Kelly did a great job singing the National Anthem and we appreciate her being there.

After some opening remarks by the Chapter President, Greg Thompson and Jessica Clark performed the Missing Man Table ceremony and did an excellent job. After the Missing Man Table ceremony, the Chapter President gave some closing remarks and handed out the 51 Dog Tags of our Indiana Vietnam War MIAs to the group. The Dog Tags will be hung on the Wreath during Roll Call ceremony at the Vietnam War memorial.

FNG buttons were also handed out to our 24 first time guest. Several of the FNG's were young adults and I hope the event educated them on the price of freedom and the men and women that have paid the ultimate price for that freedom. The sendoff program ended with few final words from Chaplain Tom Ransdell followed by the benediction.

For many years, Rolling Thunder® and guest would leave the Pentagon parking lot on the Ride for Freedom demonstration through the streets of Washington D.C at 12:00. To maintain that tradition, our group departed from the IVY Tech Parking lot to the American Legion Plaza at 12:00. The group consisted of 4 squads with 35 to 40 motorcycles. The ride to the American Legion Plaza was unescorted and the squad leaders/sweeps did an outstanding job getting everyone there safely.

Upon arrival at the American Legion Plaza, we started our program at the Cenotaph, followed by the WWII, Korean War, and Vietnam War memorial. At each memorial, Chapter Member gave some history of the memorial, followed by the Chapter Honor guard laying a wreath at the memorial in honor of our Service Members that have paid the ultimate price for our freedom. At the Vietnam Memorial, the Chapter performed our roll call ceremony and place dog tags of the 51 that remain unaccounted-for from the Vietnam War. Upon conclusion of the ceremony, a three Volley salute was rendered by the Hamilton County Navy Club Ship 29 followed by echo TAPS played by the Sprit 45.



Program at the American Legion Plaza

The program started with Vern at the Cenotaph. A Cenotaph is tomb built to honor one or a group of people, and often remains as empty as the day it was built. This cenotaph was built in 1931 with the intension of being the final resting place of Cpl. James Bethel Gresham. Cpl. Gresham was from Evansville Indiana and the first casualty of WW1. Following is a little of the history of Cpl. Gresham.





CPL James Bethel Gresham Date of Birth: August 23, 1893 Home of Record: Evansville, IN Date of Death: November 3, 1917



Cpl. Gresham was born in a log cabin on August 23rd, 1893, in Mclean County Ky. His family eventually moved from here to Evansville In.

On June 4th, 1917, James Gresham enlisted with F company of the 16th Division Infantry. He was 2 months shy of 24 years old.

Cpl. Gresham was in the first group of American Soldiers sent to France in WW1. In a few months he would become number one of the first three Americans killed in WW1. Cpl. Gresham lost his life in a predawn attack on Nov. 11, 1917, near Artois France. The report reads the Americans were vastly outnumbered by the Germans in this predawn attack. The fight occurred in a trench the Americans were in. At the end of the fight Cpl. Gresham, Pvt. Thomas Enright, and Pvt. Merle Hay were killed, five more wounded and, and twelve were captured. Cpl. Gresham, Pvt. Enright, and Pvt. Hay were buried on the battlefield where they fell. Later Cpl. Gresham was exhumed and buried in an American cemetery in Bathlemon France. Finally in 1921, Cpl. Gresham was returned home and buried in Locust Hill Cemetery, Vanderburg County, Evansville In.

Cpl. Gresham's family was present for what was to be the dedication of the Cenotaph in Cpl. Gresham's honor but decided to let Cpl. Gresham continue his rest in Evansville instead. There is an inscription on the North side of the Cenotaph honoring Cpl. Gresham.

XXXIV Ride for Freedom May 29, 2022 WWII Memorial

Don and Wendy Leasure gave some historical background on the WWII memorial and read the BIO of PO2 Jack Edwin Walker. Jeff Thatcher places the wreath at the base of the memorial in honor of all of the Indiana Service Members that lost their lives in WWII and those that are still unaccounted for.





PO2 Jack Edwin Walker Date of Birth: June 14, 1923 Home of Record: Anderson, IN Date Reported Missing: July 30, 1945

Jack Edwin Walker was born in Anderson, IN on the 14th of June 1923. At the age of 22, he enlisted in the Navy. He married his wife Ruby on the 25th of May 1945.On July 30th 1945, he was aboard the greatest naval loss in American history, the USS Indianapolis.

1,195 sailors were aboard the ship. 300 went down with the ship and 890 were exposed to the seas. Only 316 survived after 4 days. Seaman Walker was never to see his daughter.

PO2 Walker's commendations included, Purple Heart, Combat Action Ribbon, World War II Victory Medal, American Campaign Medal, Navy Presidential Unit Citation, Navy Good Conduct Medal, Asiatic-Pacific Campaign Medal, and the Navy Expeditionary Medal

May 29, 2022

Korean War Memorial

Greg Thompson gave some historical background on the Korean War memorial and read the BIO of Master Sergeant Joseph McNally and First Lieutenant Forrest Steele Burns. A wreath was placed at the base of the memorial in honor of all of the Indiana Service Members that lost their lives in the Korean War and those that are still unaccounted for. The Burns family was also present to the ceremony. We were fortunate to have family members of Lieutenant Burns at the ceremony.







Date of Birth: May 2, 1925 Home of Record: Greenfield, IN Date Reported Missing: November 2, 1950

Master Sergeant Joseph Lawrence McNally (known as "JO" to friends and family) was a member of Company A of the 1st Battalion, 8th Cavalry Regiment, 1st Cavalry Division. On November 2, 1950, Company A was occupying defensive positions with the 1st Battalion near Unsan, when it came under intense attack and was forced to withdraw. Master Sergeant McNally was reported missing during the withdrawal, though specific details regarding his loss are unknown. He was never reported as a prisoner of war, and his remains were not identified among those returned to the U.S. following the war.



Date of Birth: February 16, 1922 Home of Record: Columbus, IN Date Reported Killed In Action/Remains not Recovered: August 30, 1952

First Lieutenant Forrest Steele Burns, who joined the U.S. Army from Indiana, was a member of Company H of the 2nd Battalion, 38th Infantry Regiment, 2nd Infantry Division. On August 30, 1952, he was involved in a patrol in the area north of Seoul. While attempting to organize his platoon's positions, he stepped on an enemy anti-personnel mine, and was killed instantly. The immediate area of his loss was soon lost to enemy control, and now lies on the North Korean side of the Demilitarized Zone, preventing searches for his remains. Before First Lieutenant Burns served in the Korean War, he also served in WWII and was a POW for four months.

Vietnam War Memorial

Mike Clark gave some historical background on the Vietnam War memorial. A wreath was placed at the base of the memorial in honor of all of the Indiana Service Members that lost their lives in the Vietnam War and those that are still unaccounted for. The Chapter also performed our Roll Call ceremony for the 51 Indiana Service Members that are still missing from the Vietnam War. As the names were called out, the guest would walk forward and place the Dog Tag of the MIA on the wreath.

Mike also read the BIO of Sergeant First Class Ronald Eugene Smith who is still missing and Captain Mary Therese Klinker who is one of eight women killed in the Vietnam War.



Ronald Eugene Smith E7/US Army Special Forces Date of Loss: 28 Nov 1970

Sergeant First Class Smith specialty was Light Weapons Infantry and a member of Command and Control Central, 5th Special Forces Group.

On November 28, 1970, he was a member of a long range reconnaissance team in Attopeu Province, Laos near the tri-border area of Vietnam, Laos and Cambodia.

The team came under enemy attack and Sergeant First Class Smith was killed. His remains were not recovered.



There are currently 58,318 names listed on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial wall in Washington DC.

Of the 58,318 names listed on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial wall, 1,614 are Indiana Hoosiers, and listed on this memorial. 1,613 are men and 1 woman.

Captain May Therese Klinker's BIO is on the right.



Captain Mary Therese Klinker United States Airforce

Date of Birth: October 3, 1947 Home of Record: Lafayette, IN Date of Death: April 4, 1975

Captain Mary Therese Klinker, U.S. Air Force was part of an on-board medical team during Operation Babylift. Her flight was carrying 243 infants and children when it developed pressure problems and crashed while attempting to return to the airport. Captain Klinker was killed on April 4, 1975, just three weeks before the Fall of Saigon. Captain Klinker's name is listed on Panel 7, Line 72

Vietnam War Memorial

The names of the men and women killed in the conflict or remain Missing in Action are inscribed on the concave side of the monuments. On the convex sides, which face the streets, inscriptions include narrative on the conduct of the wars and excerpts from letters written by troops from the battlefield. Listed below are a few of those letters.

Frederick B. King, December 13, 1967

Dear Mom& Dad & Kids Most of us are scared to death, but somebody has to fight this dirty war. Love always Fred (The soldier boy) Killed in Action, November 25, 1968

Ernest L. Bridges, October 18, 1967

We got some of the best Marines in the world with us here. I wouldn't want to be any place else.

Love always, Larry Killed in Acton April 4, 1968

Larry D Fogle, Fort Gordon, GA 1963

Dear Dad, if I do go into combat, I intend on doing my job to the best of my ability. However, I don't intend on being a hero. I might be wrong; but in my way of thinking, the only heroes there, are the men who get killed in the process of doing their job.

Love always, Larry

Killed in Action, December 20, 1965

James N. Katrenics, October 13, 1966

Dear Mom and Dad,

Dad, do you remember the war stories you told me? Well, I've got some of my own now; only thing is, I don't think I'll be telling them for a while.

Merry Christmas, Jim

Killed in Action April 8, 1967

There are currently 58,318 names listed on the Vietnam Veterans Memorial wall in Washington DC which probably had similar stories. We must insure these men and women are never forgotten and their sacrifices are not in vain.

Conclusion

The program ended with a 3-Vally Salute by the Hamilton County Navy Club Ship 29 and Echo TAPS played by the Sprit 45. TAPS is commonly known as the final bugle call and is a sign of respect and a tribute to those known, and unknown.

The main group stood at the Vietnam Memorial while one bugler stood at the WWII Memorial and the other at the Korean War Memorial. The sound of the Echo TAPS rang through the American Legion Plaza as they played.

The Navy Club and Sprit 45 did an excellent job with the 3-Valley Salute and TAPS.



Rolling Thunder®, Inc. Membership Patches and Obligations National Constitution

The Rolling Thunder® patches are items that members strive to obtain. The Boot patch represents the members Chapter, and the Rocker and Eagle represents Rolling Thunder® National. These patches should be worn proudly and with respect. When a member is issued these patches, they have an obligation to take care of them and turn them in if they decide to quit Rolling Thunder® for whatever reason. Below is an abstract from the National Constitution on the members obligations that they agree to when they receive these patches.



The Chapter Boot Patch. All members will receive a Rolling Thunder® Membership Boot patch when they become a full member at the end of a 120-day period. If a member meets his/her obligations before the 120 days are up they are entitled to receive their Boot patch no earlier than 90 days, provided they meet all other (loyalty and conduct) requirements. A new member must make 3 meetings or events, or a combination thereof, during the 120-day trial period to become a full member. A \$50.00 patch deposit is required before National will issue the Boot Patch.



The Rocker and Eagle Patches. After a member completes his/her first year (from the day they receive their boot patch) as a member in good standing ,they will be issued the Eagle & Rocker patches, <u>which is the property of</u> <u>National</u>. A \$100.00 patch deposit is required before National will issue the Rocker and Eagle Patches.

Membership Obligations

Retrieve Patches: It's the Chapters responsibility to retrieve all patches. If a member does not renew dues in a reasonable time, thirty days from the end of February the Chapter President or his appointed representative will collect their patches. Any Chapter that does not retrieve the members patches will be held liable for their cost. Any problems from a delinquent member to collect our property, if needed have a lawyer send a letter and take them to court (quote the constitution) that a member will pay all court and lawyers fees. The Chapter will pay National \$150.00 per set lost and members deposit will not be refunded.

If you mail your patches to the Chapter, make sure you send the package <u>CERTIFIED</u> or <u>PRIORITY</u> mail for tracking purposes and insure the package for \$150.00.


