

The Battle of Anacostia Flats

The use of military and/or police in Washington D. C. to quash protests is not an unfamiliar occurrence. However, the 'bonus march' is probably unknown to most or at best forgotten. Following is an accounting prepared by Joseph Giglio of WWI veterans desperate in times of the depression to get advance payment of bonuses.

"In 1924, Congress rewarded veterans of the First World War with bonuses of a bit more than \$1,000 per soldier, but they were not scheduled for full payment until 1945.

Unemployed veterans petitioned for immediate payment to alleviate the economic hardships of former servicemen who had lost their jobs in the early days of the Great Depression. In 1930, over President Hoover's veto, the Democratic Congress voted to pay the veterans a little more than half of the amount promised. More than 20,000 veterans of the World War Expeditionary Force with their wives and children from all over the country descended on Washington in the spring and summer of 1932 and promised to stay until Congress approved legislation to pay the balance of the bonuses.

By June the veterans who styled themselves as the Bonus Expeditionary Force were camping in shacks and tents across the river from the capital and occupying vacant buildings in the city. In mid-June, the House of Representatives passed a bill that authorized the immediate payout of the bonus, but the Senate rejected the bill. President Hoover, concerned about balancing the budget, continued to oppose the veterans request. Most of the veterans returned home but an estimated 2,000 to 10,000 had nowhere to go and remained with their families to engage in protests.

Many in the Hoover administration saw the bonus marchers as a threat to national security. In mid-July, President Hoover ordered the police to clear the bonus marchers out of several abandoned federal buildings that they were occupying.

When the evictions began, several marchers threw rocks at the police, who then opened fire. Two veterans were killed and an ugly riot followed. The local authorities appealed to President Hoover for help. The violence provided him with the excuse he had been seeking to use force, and he ordered the United States Army to help police clear out the buildings.

Late in the afternoon of July 28, General Douglas MacArthur, the Army chief of staff, undertook the assignment with the assistance of his aide Dwight D. Eisenhower. He led the Third Cavalry under the command of George S. Patton, along with two infantry regiments with fixed bayonets, a machine-gun detachment, and six tanks that, for the first time in American history, drove down Pennsylvania Avenue in pursuit of the marchers. The troops used tear gas to drive the veterans out of the buildings and then through the crowded streets of the capital.

As the marchers retreated, General MacArthur exceeded his orders, just as he would do in Korea two decades later, to secure the building and contain the marchers at their camp. He pursued them to their Shantytown across the Anacostia River and ordered his troops to burn the tent city where the former servicemen and their families camped. Reportedly, 55 veterans were injured and 135 arrested.

When General MacArthur met with the press later he said: "That mob down there was a bad-looking mob. It was animated by the essence of revolution". He sought to justify his actions by arguing that the bonus marchers were attempting to overthrow the government.

The Battle of Anacostia Flats -Continued -

The Battle of Anacostia Flats outraged many Americans and marked the low point of President's Hoover's tenure. The bonus march contributed to his defeat to Franklin Roosevelt three months later and was a catalyst for social change.

In 1936, Congress finally passed, over President Roosevelt's veto, a bill to disburse about \$2 billion in bonuses. **The march laid the foundation for the G. I. Bill of Rights in 1944, which provided Second World War veterans with funds for college, housing and other benefits."**

Honorary Rolling Thunder Member Joe Kernan (Former Governor of Indiana)



JOSEPH E. KERNAN was born in Chicago, Illinois, the oldest of nine children. He graduated from St. Joseph's High School in South Bend. In 1968 he received a degree in government from the University of Notre Dame, where he was a catcher on the baseball team. Kernan entered the U.S. Navy in 1969 and served in Vietnam. In May 1972, he was shot down by the enemy while on a reconnaissance mission and held as a prisoner of war for nearly 11 months. Kernan was repatriated in 1973 and continued on active duty until December 1974. He then worked for Procter and Gamble, the Schwarz Paper Company, and the MacWilliams Corporation. He was South Bend's city controller from 1980 to 1984, and in 1987 was elected mayor. He was reelected mayor in 1991 and again in 1995 with more than 82 percent of the vote – becoming the longest serving mayor in South Bend's history. In 1996, Governor Frank O'Bannon and Kernan were elected to the state's top two positions and were reelected in 2000. As lieutenant governor, Kernan served as the president of the Indiana Senate, the director of the Indiana Department of Commerce, and the commissioner of Agriculture.

His accomplishments include developing and chairing a number of state working groups, including the bipartisan Agricultural Crisis Working Group, the 21st Century Research and Technology Fund, and the Insurance Industry Working Group. In 1999 Kernan launched the Veterans Outreach Initiative to encourage veterans to take advantage of the state and federal benefits they have earned by serving our country. During Kernan's tenure as director of the state's Department of Commerce, Indiana recorded its second-highest export numbers in history.


In October 2001, Kernan unveiled the administration's comprehensive plan to overhaul the state's tax system, developed with a group of bi-partisan fiscal and tax experts, and in June 2002 the state assembly passed a tax reform plan based on his work. Following this success, the O'Bannon-Kernan administration proposed a sweeping job creation plan called Energize Indiana to create high-wage, high-skill jobs in the life sciences, advanced manufacturing, information technology, and high-tech distribution sectors through unprecedented investment in research and technology, rural development, workforce development, and intermodal transportation.

On September 13, 2003, Kernan assumed the duties of the governorship after Governor O'Bannon died from complications from a stroke. Kernan and his wife, First Lady Maggie Kernan, were married in 1974.

For his service Kernan received the Navy Commendation Metal, 2 Purple Hearts, and the Distinguished Flying Cross. Kernan passed away peacefully in his beloved hometown of South Bend on July 29, 2020.


Indiana POW/MIA Specialty Plates



Rolling Thunder® , Inc. Membership Patches and Obligations

National Constitution

The Rolling Thunder® patches are items that members strive to obtain. The Boot patch represents the members Chapter, and the Rocker and Eagle represents Rolling Thunder® National. These patches should be worn proudly and with respect. When a member is issued these patches, they have an obligation to take care of them and turn them in if they decide to quit Rolling Thunder® for whatever reason. Below is an abstract from the National Constitution on the members obligations that they agree to when they receive these patches.



The Chapter Boot Patch. All members will receive a Rolling Thunder® Membership Boot patch when they become a full member at the end of a 120-day period. If a member meets his/her obligations before the 120 days are up they are entitled to receive their Boot patch no earlier than 90 days, provided they meet all other (loyalty and conduct) requirements. A new member must make 3 meetings or events, or a combination thereof, during the 120-day trial period to become a full member. **A \$50.00 patch deposit is required before National will issue the Boot Patch.**



The Rocker and Eagle Patches. After a member completes his/her first year (from the day they receive their boot patch) as a member in good standing ,they will be issued the Eagle & Rocker patches, **which is the property of National.** **A \$100.00 patch deposit is required before National will issue the Rocker and Eagle Patches.**

Membership Obligations

Retrieve Patches: It's the Chapters responsibility to retrieve all patches. If a member does not renew dues in a reasonable time, thirty days from the end of February the Chapter President or his appointed representative will collect their patches. Any Chapter that does not retrieve the members patches will be held liable for their cost. Any problems from a delinquent member to collect our property, if needed have a lawyer send a letter and take them to court (quote the constitution) that a member will pay all court and lawyers fees. **The Chapter will pay National \$150.00 per set lost and members deposit will not be refunded.**

If you mail your patches to the Chapter, make sure you send the package CERTIFIED or PRIORITY mail for tracking purposes and insure the package for \$150.00.
