Our April Chapter Meeting Speaker





Our speaker Becky Holbert, a Director for The Ernie Pyle WWII Museum in Dana, IN. She talked about the museum and the legacy of Ernie Pyle, an American WWII journalist and Pulitzer Prize winner from Indiana.

Becky gave the attending members the book On A Wing And A Prayer that was a compilation of columns that Ernie wrote on aviation from September 1928 to June 1932. Ernie had the opportunity to meet many of the famous pilots of the time. She also gave everyone the booklet Images Of Brown County by Ernie Pyle. Ernie had spent two weeks in Brown County and wrote twelve columns. Those were written August 14, 1940 to August 27, 1940. It is amazing that for us that have ridden to Nashville, those columns while over 80 years old, resonate in many ways with what we see and experience today.

Thanks to Ernie Pyle, military service personnel today are rewarded with combat pay. The most famous and most widely reprinted column was <u>The Death of Captain Waskow</u>. A reprint of that column follows.



The Death of Captain Waskow

AT THE FRONT LINES IN ITALY, January 10, 1944 – In this war I have known a lot of officers who were loved and respected by the soldiers under them. But never have I crossed the trail of any man as beloved as Capt. Henry T. Waskow of Belton, Texas.

Capt. Waskow was a company commander in the 36th Division. He had led his company since long before it left the States. He was very young, only in his middle twenties, but he carried in him a sincerity and gentleness that made people want to be guided by him.

"After my own father, he came next," a sergeant told me.

"He always looked after us," a soldier said. "He'd go to bat for us every time."

"I've never knowed him to do anything unfair," another one said.

I was at the foot of the mule trail the night they brought Capt. Waskow's body down. The moon was nearly full at the time, and you could see far up the trail, and even part way across the valley below. Soldiers made shadows in the moonlight as they walked.

Dead men had been coming down the mountain all evening, lashed onto the backs of mules. They came lying belly-down across the wooden pack-saddles, their heads hanging down on the left side of the mule, their stiffened legs sticking out awkwardly from the other side, bobbing up and down as the mule walked.

The Italian mule-skinners were afraid to walk beside dead men, so Americans had to lead the mules down that night. Even the Americans were reluctant to unlash and lift off the bodies at the bottom, so an officer had to do it himself, and ask others to help.

The first one came early in the morning. They slid him down from the mule and stood him on his feet for a moment, while they got a new grip. In the half light he might have been merely a sick man standing there, leaning on the others. Then they laid him on the ground in the shadow of the low stone wall alongside the road.

I don't know who that first one was. You feel small in the presence of dead men, and ashamed at being alive, and you don't ask silly questions.

We left him there beside the road, that first one, and we all went back into the cowshed and sat on water cans or lay on the straw, waiting for the next batch of mules.

Somebody said the dead soldier had been dead for four days, and then nobody said anything more about it. We talked soldier talk for an hour or more. The dead man lay all alone outside in the shadow of the low stone wall.

Then a soldier came into the cowshed and said there were some more bodies outside. We went out into the road. Four mules stood there, in the moonlight, in the road where the trail came down off the mountain. The soldiers who led them stood there waiting. "This one is Captain Waskow," one of them said quietly.

Two men unlashed his body from the mule and lifted it off and laid it in the shadow beside the low stone wall. Other men took the other bodies off. Finally there were five lying end to end in a long row, alongside the road. You don't cover up dead men in the combat zone. They just lie there in the shadows until somebody else comes after them.

The unburdened mules moved off to their olive orchard. The men in the road seemed reluctant to leave. They stood around, and gradually one by one I could sense them moving close to Capt. Waskow's body. Not so much to look, I think, as to say something in finality to him, and to themselves. I stood close by and I could hear.

One soldier came and looked down, and he said out loud, "God damn it." That's all he said, and then he walked away. Another one came. He said, "God damn it to hell anyway." He looked down for a few last moments, and then he turned and left.

Another man came; I think he was an officer. It was hard to tell officers from men in the half light, for all were bearded and grimy dirty. The man looked down into the dead captain's face, and then he spoke directly to him, as though he were alive. He said: "I'm sorry, old man."

Then a soldier came and stood beside the officer, and bent over, and he too spoke to his dead captain, not in a whisper but awfully tenderly, and he said:


"I sure am sorry, sir."

Then the first man squatted down, and he reached down and took the dead hand, and he sat there for a full five minutes, holding the dead hand in his own and looking intently into the dead face, and he never uttered a sound all the time he sat there.

And finally he put the hand down, and then reached up and gently straightened the points of the captain's shirt collar, and then he sort of rearranged the tattered edges of his uniform around the wound. And then he got up and walked away down the road in the moonlight, all alone.

After that the rest of us went back into the cowshed, leaving the five dead men lying in a line, end to end, in the shadow of the low stone wall. We lay down on the straw in the cowshed, and pretty soon we were all asleep.

May Chapter Meeting Guest Speaker

A Nugget in Indiana's Military History Freeman Army Airfield Museum, Seymour, IN

Named for Capt. Richard Freeman (killed in a B-17 crash near Lovelock, Nevada in February, 1941), Freeman Field was started in May 1942 and covers 4 square miles. Construction time was 9 months, 5/42 to 2/43.

Originally there were four paved runways, each one 5580 feet long and 150 feet wide, with 9 taxiways out to the runways.

250 Beech AT-10's were used to train 4245 pilots. 19 classes were graduated from 4/23/43 to 2/1/1945. 23 cadet pilots were killed in training. About 5000 men and women were stationed here at the peak of operations. The pilots who trained at Freeman Field had been through basic flight school and already knew how to fly. They were here to learn multi-engine aircraft operations and flight solely by reference to instruments. From Freeman Field they went to their third and final level of training at another base to learn to fly bombers and transports.



September 1944: The first US helicopter training base was

established at Freeman Field using the primitive Sikorsky R4 "Hoverfly". After a few months it moved to Chanute Army Airfield in Rantoul, IL.

March 1, 1945: The 477th Bomb Group, known as the Tuskegee Airmen, was transferred to Freeman Field. They were here for only 5 weeks. The "Freeman Field Mutiny", an attempt to integrate the white Officer's Club, ensued. There were no serious injuries and only 3 black officers were court-martialed; only one found guilty. The incident was a catalyst for the desegregation of the US armed services.

June 1945: Freeman Field designated as the Foreign Aircraft Evaluation Center. 160 enemy aircraft, including German jets, V-1 buzz bombs and V-2 rockets, were shipped here. One combat pilot was killed in 1945 while evaluating a Focke-Wulf Fw-190.

November 1945: USAAF glider branch flight test and engineering operations were moved to Freeman Field from Clinton County Army Air Field, Wilmington Ohio. After only 5 months (March, '46), glider operations were moved to Wright Field.

October 1946: The foreign aircraft evaluation period came to an end. Remaining whole aircraft were sent to museums around the country. Parts from disassembled aircraft were buried on the field, and Freeman Field was closed. The Freemen Army Airfield era ended in 1947 when it was deeded to the City of Seymour for one dollar.


IMPROMPT Covington Sponsorship Ride April 24th


Rolling Thunder® XXXVII Ride for Freedom May 26, 2025

The event will start at the Fort Harrison Veterans Center located at 9450 East 59th Street Indianapolis, IN 46226 and will end up at the Veterans National Memorial Shrine and Museum located at 2122 O'Day Rd, Fort Wayne, IN 46818. The details for the 37th annual Ride for Freedom will be located on our website at www.indianarollingthunder.com.

The Veterans National Memorial Shrine and Museum has a ¾ replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memoria Wall like the one in Washington DC. They also have a Korean War Memorial that was dedicated in 2024. The Korean War Memorial is similar to the one in Washington DC with the exception that the faces on the on the Veterans National Memorial Shrine and Museum Korean War Memorial are ones from Allen County.

They have the Merci 40 & 8 Box Car given to Indiana by the French Government in 1949 after World War II. The Veterans National Memorial Shrine and Museum dedicated Global War on Terror Memorial this past June which Honors all those Gold Star family members killed in combat. New monuments scheduled to be dedicated in 2025 are a World War I Monument; a World War II monument and the Global War on terrorism monuments made of Indiana limestone.

Rolling Thunder®, Inc. Indiana Chapter #1 will dedicate a POW/MIA Bench at the Veterans National Memorial Shrine and Museum on May 26th as part of the event. 
Indiana POW/MIA Specialty Plates on the Streets As of March, 2025

As of March 31, 2025, we have 4,905 POW/MIA specialty plates on the streets of Indiana helping to bring awareness to the public about our POWs, and MIAs. The funds generated from the sale of the POW/MIA Specialty plate goes towards helping our Indiana Veterans in need through the Indiana Military Family Relief Fund (MFRF). 529 plates were Renewed/Sold in March 2025.

Rolling Thunder®, Inc. Membership Patches and Obligations National Constitution

The Rolling Thunder® patches are items that members strive to obtain. The Boot patch represents the members Chapter, and the Rocker and Eagle represents Rolling Thunder® National. These patches should be worn proudly and with respect. When a member is issued these patches, they have an obligation to take care of them and turn them in if they decide to quit Rolling Thunder® for whatever reason. Below is an abstract from the National Constitution on the members obligations that they agree to when they receive these patches.



The Chapter Boot Patch. All members will receive a Rolling Thunder® Membership Boot patch when they become a full member at the end of a 120-day period. If a member meets his/her obligations before the 120 days are up they are entitled to receive their Boot patch no earlier than 90 days, provided they meet all other (loyalty and conduct) requirements. A new member must make 3 meetings or events, or a combination thereof, during the 120-day trial period to become a full member. A \$50.00 patch deposit is required



The Rocker and Eagle Patches. After a member completes his/her first year (from the day they receive their boot patch) as a member in good standing ,they will be issued the Eagle & Rocker patches, which is the property of National. A \$100.00 patch deposit is required before National will issue the Rocker and Eagle Patches.

Membership Obligations

Retrieve Patches: It's the Chapters responsibility to retrieve all patches. If a member does not renew dues in a reasonable time, thirty days from the end of February the Chapter President or his appointed representative will collect their patches. Any Chapter that does not retrieve the members patches will be held liable for their cost. Any problems from a delinquent member to collect our property, if needed have a lawyer send a letter and take them to court (quote the constitution) that a member will pay all court and lawyers fees.

The Chapter will pay National \$150.00 per set lost and members deposit will not be refunded.

If you mail your patches to the Chapter, make sure you send the package <u>CERTIFIED</u> or <u>PRIORITY</u> mail for tracking purposes and insure the package for \$150.00.

Please DO NOT Glue your patches on your vest. National will NOT accept damaged patches and you may lose your patch refundon 31


